## Turtle Nesting Sightings

*“Turtles appear to be on the move a bit earlier this year, although I am still expecting higher numbers over the next few weeks,”* commented Dr Jacqueline Giles, our Oblong Turtle Consultant.

Reports are coming in, via the *Turtle Hotline* that turtle nesting has commenced for this season. *Hotline* observations have been received from the Cockburn Wetlands Education Centre (CWEC) and Canning River Eco Education Centre (CREEC). Joe Tonga, our camera surveillance consultant, is assessing the information in terms of suitability of the nesting sites for camera monitoring.

If you see nesting behaviour in the 3 research areas –

- Herdsman Lake (Herdsman Lake Wildlife Centre, HLWC),
- Bibra Lake (CWEC),
- Canning River (CREEC/SERCUL)

please advise the eco centre staff and complete the hotline form.

HLWC, CWEC, CREEC or SERCUL will then contact Elaine, who will inform Joe.

Dr Jacqueline Giles, our Oblong Turtle Consultant, provided valuable input regarding **predator observations** for the hotline form. As we are recording ‘predators,’ these will generally be the predators of the adults. However, Dr Giles pointed out that *“fungus preys upon eggs (rather what is inside the egg...), and ants are also predators of hatchlings (in particular the Argentine ant)”*. These latter observations are very useful too and will assist us to develop a more thorough understanding of the ‘predator’ picture. If you notice evidence of such predators please add this information to the hotline form.

Denise Crosbie at CWEC has provided printouts of the ‘**community recording sheet**’ to the bushland management crews at the City of Cockburn to leave in their vehicles in case they come across turtles while in the field. If you do not already have copies of these and would like them, please contact Elaine.

**Action:** Please keep the nesting reports flowing in. Send information to Elaine for urgent action. Thank you.

## Turtles Visited the Frogfest!

The third of our six community education events was held on Friday 30<sup>th</sup> September at the HLWC Frogfest. ### **Oblong Turtle Collaborative Research Group**

The last meeting of the Oblong Turtle Collaborative Research Group was held on Monday the 29th August, 1.30pm, at Murdoch University in the Environmental Science Building seminar room. Caitlyn (Murdoch University) and Shino's (UWA) PhD research is progressing very well, with Shino providing some preliminary results from genetic analyses of 95 turtles. Dr Giles also advised the turtle monitoring program at Bibra Lake started at the end this month (30<sup>th</sup> Sept /1<sup>st</sup> -2<sup>nd</sup> Oct).
